

WHAT CHILDREN REALLY DESIRE IS

RELATIONSHIPS NOT THINGS



Children form concepts about God and Jesus from birth. I am often asked, "How do you know when a child is ready?" Children develop at different rates, so the personal decision to follow Christ varies. A change in behavior may be a clue that the Holy Spirit is drawing a child to a relationship with Jesus. John 16:7-13 tells us the Holy Spirit will convict us of our "sin, righteousness and judgment" and guide us "into all truth."

VBS, Sunday School, and other teachers should always be prepared to share Bible facts as children are involved with Bible activities. Doing so will insure that children have many opportunities to hear Bible truths. Be especially mindful of children who rarely attend church. When you accept and love all children you show that God loves and accepts everyone. Create opportunities 'to say, "I'd like to tell you more about God's plan for your life." Each child, the one who attends every Sunday, as well as the one who attends infrequently, will know that you are one who is willing to take the time to talk to them about personal matters.

LEADING CHILDREN IN
JOURNEY WITH CHRIST
ACCEPTING
HIM AS LORD
AND SAVIOR

The Bible clearly states what one must do to accept Christ, but it is the Holy Spirit who brings understanding. Use your Bible as you share Bible facts about following Christ in a simple and honest way and then allow the Holy Spirit to draw children to Christ.

THE SIMPLE GOSPEL STORY

- 1. God has a plan for our life. God made people because He wanted to have a friendship with people. When Adam and Eve (the first people) chose to go their own way rather than God's way (Genesis 1 and 2), they sinned. People still sin today when they disobey God, but He still loves them and wants to forgive them.
- 2. God sent Jesus to be our Savior. Because God loves people He sent Jesus Christ to show us how much He loves us. God sent Jesus to save people from their sins (Matthew 1:21). The Bible tells us how Jesus did miracles that only God could do, because Jesus was God (John 14:8-9). Some people didn't like it because Jesus was God so they decided He should die on a cross. Jesus could have stopped them, but he chose to die for us. What Jesus did provides forgiveness for our sins (Romans 5:8).
- 3. Everyone sins (Romans 3:23). The Bible tells us that everyone sins.

They spent time together, prayed, worshipped, did things that only God could do through them, gave their money to people who needed it, and led others to believe in Jesus Christ (Acts 2:42-47). Churches today are made up of people who believe in Jesus Christ and have been baptized. They want to do His work by telling others about Jesus, praying for themselves and others, loving, and helping others in need.

To become a member of a church, we are to believe Jesus Christ is the Son of God, be baptized, and promise to live the way Jesus wants us to live.

LEADING CHILDREN IN THEIR JOURNEY WITH CHRIST: THE LORD'S SUPPER

Help children know that the Lord's Supper is something people at church do to remember what Jesus did for us. Help children know that: The Lord's Supper began with Jesus, Jesus gave His disciples bread to eat and fruit of the vine to drink to remind them of what He did for people (Matthew 26:26-30). When believers (Christians) take the Lord's Supper, we are to: Remember that Jesus gave Hislife for us. The broken bread is to remind us that Jesus gave His body for us. Drinking red grape juice is to remind us that Jesus bled for us (1 Corinthians 11:23-26). Think about Jesus. "Do this in remembrance of me" (1 Corinthians 11:25). Think about ourselves. We need to ask ourselves if we are doing what God wants us to do (1 Corinthians 11:28). Ask Jesus to forgive us of the things we are doing wrong and tell Him we will try to be like Him (1 Corinthians 11:28).

LEADING CHILDREN IN THEIR JOURNEY WITH CHRIST: GUIDING CHILDREN TO PRAY

Introducing children to prayer is helping them to have a friendship with Jesus. Tell children that Jesus wants us to pray (Matthew 7:7) and that it is simply talking and listening to God. Jesus gave us an example of how to pray when He taught His disciples how to pray (Matthew 6:9-13). Jesus told them to

pray: Giving thanks and praise to God, For courage and strength, For what they need, and For forgiveness.

God promises to hear and answer prayers (Mark 11:24). Explain that people can pray standing, sitting, or kneeling. Some people close their eyes so that they can think about God. To God the way we stand or sit is not as important as the way we feel about Him and others (Mark 11:25).

JOURNEY WITH ACCEPTING HIM AS LORD AND SAVIOR



In front of the parents, explain that God wants us to tell others about our decision to follow Christ (Matthew 10:32) by making the decision public in the next worship service. 5. Follow-up with the child.
